 Unbelievable: a rabbit with antlers and wings! The rare Wolpertinger can be admired in the hunting museum at Neuhauser Straße 2. Just around the corner, "the devil is said to have stomped furiously" and left a footprint in the cathedral (Frauenkirche). A few hundred meters further on, in the old courtyard, once resided Emperor Ludwig the Bavarian. Even some monkeys used to live there! One of them even kidnapped a baby. If you would like to learn more, visit the info point at Burgkeller (Alter Hof 1). There you'll hear the whole story, find enormous bricks, puzzles, films, and much more. And best of all: it's all for free!






Why not meet at the South Pole for once?






Tip: “Jugendkunstschulen” – Art schools for kids

From prehistoric dinosaurs to modern technology, from the fire brigade to the starry sky – museums brighten up a cloudy day.



The life of the dinosaurs

At the Palaeontological Museum you can see giant flying, placodont and ichthyosaur dinosaurs, the largest Bavarian dinosaur and the last dinosaurs as well as ice age mammals such as giant deer and sabre-toothed tigers. At the heart of the exhibition, you'll see the skeleton of a giant prehistoric elephant found in Mühldorf. Nearly all of the skeletons are originals.

Sparkling stars and night skies

Guided tours for kids are offered at the public observatory every Friday at 5 p.m. Take a seat in the planetarium beneath a starry sky and observe the universe. Then take a walk through the observatory. In good weather you can observe the planets through huge telescopes.

Gaze at the starry sky in the observatory of Deutsches Museum (German Museum). In the planetarium, the Milky Way, the planets and of course a multitude of stars are shining. Guided tours take place Monday to Friday at 20:00 (September–March) or 21:00 (April–August) in all weather conditions.






Forest miracles and feral pigs

Pupate, hatch and flutter away

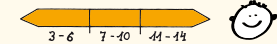
Hurray! It's freezing!

Tip: grilling sausages and dancing around the fire

On the Isar and in many park areas there are designated barbecue sites where you can grill sausages on the fire and bake Stockbrot, a special kind of bread, made out of yeast dough which is traditionally grilled on a stick on the fire. Light a potato fire at the barbecue site and dance around it like an Indian!





For the Christmas season

The best way to experience the special charm of the lights shining in the streets, in windows and gardens during the holiday season is to take a pleasant walk at twilight. Look how everything glitters, sparkles and shines!

1,5h Take a walk through the Christmas story

When visiting the churches of Munich at this time of the year you can discover stories from the bible. The Christmas mangers show scenes around the birth of Jesus and the adoration of the Three Wise Men. The all-season-mangers show different stories depending on the season.
